



J.K. Place Roma, Rome There was huge buzz about this place - the third hotel from Ori Kafri - long before it opened its doors near the Spanish Steps last year. It was worth the wait. Designed as a home from home by Italian architect Michele Bönan, there's a library downstairs with shelves full of glossy coffee table art books, a glassceilinged living room and a sleek wood-panelled bar that wouldn't look out of place in Mad Men. Much of the furniture is custom-made in Tuscany; all of it is utterly chic. Stay in a master suite, with dove grey walls, a walk-in wardrobe and a modern four-poster. Spend the day exploring then hotfoot it back to the hotel for a bistro-style bite to eat; serious-sized burgers, spaghetti vongole and a mini kilner jar of perfect

tiramisu, all served up to chilled-out Bossa Nova beats.

New Hotel, Athens

Owned by the art collector Dakis Joannou, this renovated 1960s hotel is brilliantly located in the centre of Athens' Plaka district with its little backstreets full of fun shops and cafés. The exterior is an uninspiring block, but inside the Brazilian design duo Fernando and Humberto Campana have worked their whacky eco magic, lining up little cactuses as an art installation, making their signature Favelo chairs from bits of old wooden furniture and creating clever wall art for the 79 bedrooms using vintage postcards, evil eyes and Karagiozis (or shadow puppets) to reflect the history of the local area. The main draw is the restaurant and bar on the rooftop for its views across the city - a perfect place for a sundowner. A rare contemporary find in a buzzy city.

Shangri La at The Shard, London OK, so it may feel a bit like it's geared towards an Asian businessman (read 'a tad corporate'), but that is no reason not to make this highflier top of your staycation list. Even if it's not the super-whizzy lift that takes you to the 35th floor in 26 seconds flat, or 'the best steak this side of Argentina' at Ting restaurant; or even the fact that the loo seats are heated and have both a front and back warm water hose to clean your parts; then it's those literally epic, jaw-dropping views that melt a Londoner's heart. Seriously, you're so high that the trains down on earth look like sluggish caterpillars. The location, too, is way more funky than the retail-obsessed West End, with Tate Modern, Shakespeare's Globe and divine Borough Market just a stroll away.
